The North Team

The Aylesbury North Community Policing team consists of Police Constable Ash Collins, Police Constable Angus Hay along with Police Community Support Officer Dan Lenard.

The Aylesbury North Neighbourhood Team arrested Giuseppina Rossetti numerous times in November 2024. Following this she was charged for breaching a restraining order on three occasions and breaching a community protection notice on one occasion. A restraining order is in place that prohibits Rossetti from attending a street in Aylesbury or making contact with the victim. Despite this she was located within a property on this street with the victim on 3 separate occasions by police (18th, 22nd and 26th of November). On the 22nd November Rossetti also attended an address in Aylesbury and asked the resident for money. Rossetti was issued with a Community Protection Notice earlier this year which prohibits her from doing this.



Following the investigations, for which Neighbourhood Officer PC3231 COLLINS is the officer in the case, she was remanded to court and committed to prison for 12 weeks.

Following these incidents the Neighbourhood Policing Team with assistance from the Harm Reduction Unit obtained a Criminal Behaviour Order at Wycombe Magistrates Court on 25th November. This order is valid for 2 years and has the following prohibitions attached:

1. Not to enter any garden or driveway of a dwelling house, or any dwelling house, or any private vehicle, without the owner's prior permission.
2. Not to stay on any land or premise after being asked to leave by the owner/occupier/police constable or PCSO.
3. Not to approach members of the public to ask for money, goods or lifts in their vehicles.

In November 2024, PCSO 9494 LEONARD attended The Elms in Aylesbury which is an extra care housing facility for people aged over 55. There had been a few incidents which required police attendance so the Housing Association and the Police set up a meeting with the residents. The meeting had inputs from the police, a supported housing officer and an ASB officer. The meeting was to educate residents around conflict resolution and mediation.

In October 2024, PC3231 COLLINS conducted a clear car campaign in the Cleveland Park area of Aylesbury in conjunction with the Neighbourhood Watch. This consists of walking around the area and visibly checking vehicles to see if they have left any valuable items on display. The police then send letters to the registered owners of the vehicles to educate them around not leaving their valuables on display to prevent any potential theft from vehicles.

In November 2024, PC 3231 COLLINS and PCSO 9494 Leonard attended Aylesbury Mosque on Havelock Street during Friday Prayer as part of Islamophobia month. This was a great opportunity for the Neighbourhood team to engage with the Muslim community.

In November 2024, whilst on foot patrol, PC 3231 COLLINS located a male that was one of the top twenty most prolific shoplifters in Aylesbury, as he was wanted on a recall to prison.

Speeding Concerns: Speeding is a frequent concern in our villages. While speed enforcement can hold speeding motorists accountable, research indicates it is not the most effective deterrent. Instead, road layouts and other measures prove more successful. Nevertheless, our neighbourhood team has acquired speed guns and has been actively monitoring and catching speeding drivers. We will focus our speed enforcement efforts on areas identified by the community as problematic. If speeding is a concern to you, please look to become involved in the community speed watch programme (link at the end of the newsletter).

Parking Concerns: Parking is a common issue across all our areas, often leading to neighbourhood disputes and community tension. We provide advice on an individual basis and, in some cases, work with schools to send polite notices to parents where parking is an issue during drop-off and pick-up times. We also patrol during these times, leaving notices and issuing tickets where applicable. Consideration notices stating that Thames Valley Police (TVP) are aware and monitoring have been issued in peak areas to act as a deterrent in the absence of road markings.
